PRESIDENT: Next light that I have on for recognition is Senator Hefner and then I have you on next for recognition. I have had you on for recognition. I recognized Senator Pappas, didn't I? Senator Landis and then the speaking order is Senator Warner, Vard Johnson, DeCamp, Wesely and Schmit. Senator Landis. Very well. Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, a point of order, I guess. I don't want to get involved in the issue, but how long have we been using E & R amendments to amend?

PRESIDENT: Well, there is some precedent for it in the past. I know...(interruption.)

SENATOR WARNER: If that's a new practice, I would suggest it's one that ends today because it will be subject to abuse to beyond anybody's imagination. If we've used it before, I missed it. And if it takes a rule change or a motion or just an act on the Chair to hold it out of order, I happen to be for Senator Hefner's amendment, but I am totally opposed to the chaos this approach will turn into.
