SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, members, I shocked Senator Chambers yesterday when he came around with his list and I agreed that he had a good idea. It is not often that his ideas and mine coincide. I like to think that we vote the same every time he is correct, but he may not agree with that. But I think he has a good idea here that if the federal rules are changed so that we can do this, we will be in place to adopt a speed limit that is more realistic for the state and I'd support the motion to repeal the rules.

PRESIDENT: Thank you. Senator Chambers, you have some four minutes left.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No.

PRESIDENT: The motion is to suspend the rules to allow the amendment to be considered. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. We're voting on a suspension of the rules which takes 30 votes. Please record your vote aye or nay. The motion is to suspend the rules to take up an amendment offered by Senator Chambers. Please record your vote aye or nay and the motion is to suspend the rules to take up the Chambers motion on LB 600A. May we have your attention, please. Please record your vote aye or nay on the motion to suspend the rules. The Chair will allow 20 seconds for the recording of the vote. The motion is to suspend the rules to offer an amendment by Senator Chambers. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 30 ayes, 7 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to suspend the rules.

PRESIDENT: The rules are suspended and the motion then carries. Now we have the formal amendment.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Chambers would move to amend and that amendment is on page 2143 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Chairman and members of the Legislature, what that amendment in the Journal does is what I talked to you about yesterday. It raises the speed limit on the interstate to 70 miles an hour. It places an effective date of January 15th, 1987. This is to prepare for the contingency that I think is
