

to say we have got a better quality product here. The Wheat Board or the wheat growers today are trying to put together a shipment of wheat for a designated designation that will be 50 percent better. In other words, it will have 50 percent less of the FM, 50 percent less dockage than the present standard allows. That is all it does. They want to be able to have a certificate that tells the buyer we guarantee this. We guarantee this. Rod is totally right. By the time you ship it from here to the gulf, dump it on the ship, you have breakage, dockage, et cetera, but a lot of it is deliberate, ladies and gentlemen. What these people want or are saying, we want to take the responsibility of guaranteeing, of guaranteeing. We do it every day. We do it every single day. We buy quality. We buy U.S. Choice beef. It is guaranteed to us. We buy quality products that are guaranteed. What we are trying to say is, we want to voluntarily to see if there is a better market. If we can do this, maybe then we can go back, we have made some progress, we have made some progress with the grain standards, not as much as we would like. You are going to find widespread concern about this among the elevators. Do you know what? They don't have to worry about it a bit. If they don't want to participate, tell those farmers, nuts. If I go out to the Bellwood elevator and I say, Al, I want to get some grain of a little better quality than the ordinary number two yellow standard, if the elevator can't bother with it, no problem, he doesn't have to participate. But if he says, yes, I would like to develop a market for that quality of grain, then we can cooperate. The Japanese located a facility at Enola, Nebraska. Do you know why? They told me because we want to guarantee the quality of the grain. We want to take it as it comes from the farm, put it in the hopper cars, ship it to the west coast, place it in our own ships, and maintain the integrity of that quality. They had to do it to defend themselves, ladies and gentlemen, and we ought to be ashamed. It is a disgrace. This is not much but it is a step in the right direction. It costs no one. It hurts no one. It may help someone, and, you know, that fulfills most of my standards on a bill. I don't see how Rod can disagree. That is a lot better, Rod, than most of the bills we have passed here I think you will agree, and I think that I have high hopes for Senator Johnson. I just gave him that advice about getting tough an hour ago and he is already showing it, and I appreciate that. I wish he would have got tough on the next bill or so, Rod, but the point is this. You are on the target. I just hope you don't get tough...
