PRESIDENT: Motion fails. Next item.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hoagland would move to override the Governor's line-item veto, Section 3 of the bill relating to the Nebraska Supreme Court.

PRESIDENT: Senator Hoagland, do you wish to take up your veto motion? Withdrawn, very well.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hall would move to override the Governor's veto with respect to the Department of Roads.

PRESIDENT: Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Mr. President and members, I would appreciate it if everybody would move to the handout that they received from the Appropriations Committee that lists the different agencies and shows where the cuts were that Governor Kerrey suggested. The Department of Roads, Agency 27, shows up at \$361, and my motion is to put that money back in the budget. I am not sure how the Department of Roads is going to survive without that \$361. I mean, there may be a chuckhole that goes unfilled. That would buy at least a set of snow tires for a truck. In all seriousness, this motion of mine is to bring your attention to what we are actually doing here. We have dealt with motions to put money back into education, motions to put money back into mental retardation.
