a direct attempt to prevent my being able to offer an amendment to return LB 835 for a specific amendment. I hope that if that does not happen, and the bill is not returned for a specific amendment because of procedural chicanery, that I hope the members who will vote on the bill tomorrow on Final Reading will recognize that they need not fulfill any moral obligation to pass LB 835 out of fear of reprisal from the industry. I would suggest that since the die seems to be cast, we want to recess this body, that at the time that the bill comes up that the argument not be offered that we need this bill and, therefore, et cetera, et cetera. I withdraw the motion to suspend the rules.

PRESIDENT: I hit the wrong button, sorry. Is there further discussion on Senator Schmit's motion to suspend the rules? Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Well, Mr. President, I guess he withdrew it, but if he wanted to bring up 835, and everybody was happy to do it, I have got no problem with it, but it is at the last of the list and looks to me like you would be at midnight or after and it becomes a technical or physical impossibility. Anything that is done has to be completed upstairs, returned here, and read in. And, so...

PRESIDENT: Senator Schmit withdrew his motion.

SENATOR DECAMP: Oh, well, I have got no objection to his taking up 835.

PRESIDENT: Senator Hoagland has a motion pending before us to recess until...

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Until...Mr. Speaker, 45 minutes, is that going to be enough time?

PRESIDENT: Eleven o'clock.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Eleven o'clock, right?

PRESIDENT: Motion is to recess until eleven o'clock, p.m., at which time we will need a quorum for the transaction of E & R amendments. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 10 ayes, 12 nays to recess, Mr. President.
