support it for us to have enough votes to override. So I won't engage in any discussion of the issues that you have heard discussed several times already. I hope that we will get the 30 votes and override this veto.

PRESIDENT: Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Mr. President, I would just echo Senator Chambers' remarks, and urge the body to support this override. It is the right thing to do. We definitely have the money now to do it. We are only talking about 130,000. Since 41 of us spent over \$7 million on veto overrides, another 130,000 isn't going to hurt anybody. These commissions do an awful lot of good for a lot of people. I would urge the body to support it.

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Question.

PRESIDENT: We haven't had any contrary argument. It is all noncontroversial and fine, huh? Well, is there anyone who wishes to make a statement against the motion? All right then, if no one does, I'll ask Senator Lynch to close.

SENATOR LYNCH: Just take the vote, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: All right. We'll now vote on the Lynch motion to reconsider the action previously taken on the advocacy commissions. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. You vote to reconsider, yes; no, not to reconsider. I am going to rule that 30 votes will be required for this motion to reconsider. The following vote, if this is successful, will require 30 votes anyway. Have you all voted on the Lynch motion to reconsider the previous action taken on the Governor's veto of advocacy commissions? Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: Point of order, Mr. Chairman.

PRESIDENT: Yes.

SENATOR LYNCH: Admittedly, if I can keep on talking until I think of something to say, we might get one more vote. But, seriously, does it take 25 or 30 votes on a motion to reconsider?
