

PRESIDENT: Anybody else wish to make...Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, I was wondering if we could repeal LB 662 on this bill also.

PRESIDENT: The Chair is ready to rule on the point of order. The Legislature realizes that I am extremely liberal and generous to all, believe that all matters should be discussed by the Legislative Chamber at the proper time. I rule that the proposal by Senator Chambers cannot be properly considered at the present time because it is not within the scope of the Governor's call subject.

SENATOR DECAMP: Objected to formally, or just discussed?

PRESIDENT: Senator Morehead made it a part, additional part of her objection.

SENATOR DECAMP: Oh, okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Point of order, Mr. Chairman.

PRESIDENT: Now, the ruling may be challenged if that is what you wish.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I would like, before we get to that, for you to tell me whether germaneness, because she raised that, are you upholding her on the germaneness issue?

PRESIDENT: No, I am not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All right, so that's not before us at all.

PRESIDENT: But upholding...making my ruling based on the scope of the Governor's call.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I would move to overrule the Chair and Senator Morehead ought to thank me for, in my presentation, emphasizing that germaneness is not the basis on which to challenge what I am trying to do. When we talk about the scope of a call, that scope means whatever we determine that it means. In the same way that germaneness means whatever we determine that it means.
