There is a suspension motion on the desk, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Nichol, the Speaker, would move to suspend Rule 6, Section 7(b), to permit consideration of LB 1 on Final Reading today.

PRESIDENT: You have heard the motion and I will try a voice vote. All those in favor say aye. Opposed no. The motion carried. The rules are suspended. Proceed with the reading of LB 1.

CLERK: (Commenced reading LB 1 on Final Reading.)

(Inaudible comments from the gallery.)

PRESIDENT: (Gavel.) Your point of order is not acceptable from the gallery. Continue reading the bill. Would the Sergeant-at-Arms assistant and the patrolman take care of our intruder. Proceed with the reading of the bill, please.

CLERK: (Continued reading LB 1 on Final Reading.)

PRESIDENT: Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: Mr. President, a bit of a point of order and it is only half a point of order.

PRESIDENT: State your point.

SENATOR DECAMP: The gentleman in the balcony was making a request that the bill be read slow and clear and loud so that he would or that people would understand it. I know it is our custom to read them rather quickly. In view of the fact that so much is involved as to what people are giving up on both sides of this, I wonder if it wouldn't be appropriate one time to read it slow and clear. That is no fault to Pat, in fact, quite the contrary. We make him read fast, but I would raise the point that maybe it should be read slow and clear so everybody understands what they are
