

when the session is over. If for some reason you want to take up some serious debate time this afternoon as a body, to discuss that as a body, we can do that also and I would be glad to throw it back out to you. However, given the shortness of time, and the fact that that resolution was filed just yesterday, the fact that it involves some serious matters, the fact that it involves some duplicating investigation, that is the Commonwealth Committee took, for example, Bill Wright's deposition on State Securities. There has been a grand jury investigation by the Lancaster County Grand Jury. There has been a lot of work done already and I think that our committee, one of the things we want to know is, how do we want to structure this; how serious does it have to be? Do we want to expend a lot of resources doing this if it has already been done? But we haven't had an opportunity in one day's time to gather together those materials that exist and see if, in fact, there is something to be investigated. We have not had the opportunity to hear from Senator Warner privately as to the types of allegations that he is getting, to examine whether those allegations have been examined by the Lancaster County Grand Jury, for example. There is a whole load of information that I think should come into the committee before we make this kind of a decision and maybe you feel that you are prepared out here right now to expend 50 to \$100,000 to examine State Security and American Savings. And if all of you have questions and problems in your minds then maybe we need to bring it out here and do that. However, I really don't think it is wise at this time. As a matter of procedure though and as a matter of the special session rules, I am going to raise an objection to the motion that has been raised. Under the special session rules bills have a 24-hour time line. Under the special session rules we also have a call that we have to abide by. Now we have made the decision that the call does not apply to resolutions. I have a question as to whether the call doesn't apply to resolutions of substance such as this, but nonetheless we have made the decision that the call did not apply. And I think it is equally clear following that line of philosophy that the rule that Senator Remmers is quoting as being the rule for raising this to the floor of the Legislature is not an appropriate rule for a resolution because the rules of a special session do not apply to resolutions. Otherwise, we would have had a hearing, for example, on the Mexican resolution. So I would make an objection, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, for a ruling on the
