Every suggestion for change has either made the number of Republicans more or let it be the same. There is no politics going on here. There is personalities going on. There is some thoughtful consideration being given to who...to who would really do the Legislature credit in chairing this particular committee and there are other questions that we need to look at and really try to resolve, but what is going on here today? What's going on here today? Why, all of a sudden, a resolution entered the day before the session adjourns, a special session, a resolution that is in terrible form, by the way, it doesn't even give subpoena powers to the committee, why is this being jammed down our throat in one day? I think anybody that is being thoughtful about this would surely give us a week to consider it. Thank you.
