and keep plodding ahead and try to move forward on some of these things. And the fact that there is not absolute agreement and that there are four or five different ideas doesn't mean that we're failures.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Thirty seconds.

SENATOR DECAMP: It doesn't mean that the place is in chaos. It doesn't mean that the Governor is right or wrong, that Warner is right or wrong, that DeCamp is right or wrong. All it means is that looking at this we have about three or four different ideas and that we're going to probably do some of them if we will keep plodding ahead. But I repeat, the absolute worst case, if we do nothing, if we do absolutely nothing, that's where we would end up here if we walked out right now. But the best case, we could get it all solved somewhere in between is still a lot of progress.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Time is up, Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DECAMP: So I would urge us probably to drop this idea until it becomes apparent, if that should happen, that anything else is impossible.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Higgins.

SENATOR HIGGINS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I would like to ask the Chair a couple of questions. Senator Lynch first got up and said that he would make a motion to recess from now until next January and then correct me if I'm wrong. Later I thought he stood up and said he would make a motion to just hold LB 1 until next January. Therefore, I would like to know what...did he withdraw his motion to recess? Or was that just conversation about postponing LB 1 until January? Is it all one motion, two motions? I'm just asking for clarification.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Sure. Senator Higgins, he withdrew the first motion and the motion we're on now is the motion on LB 1. For all practical purposes it was to afford Senator Lynch an opportunity to talk about whether we should adjourn or not because a large number of people indicated to me that they thought the question should be discussed. So that is what we are doing.

SENATOR HIGGINS: So we are discussing now...
