

in those things that touch them the most directly but there comes a point where you don't have enough by yourself to take care of the interests that are of concern to you. So evaluations will have to be made and I guess that is when what Senator DeCamp talked about in terms of negotiation and compromises being struck. But will the compromises be struck for the purpose of benefiting those for whom the schools should exist, namely the students, or for the special interest groups and the hangers-on that make a profit from education as a job in and of itself? When I speak about the need for quality education, I know there are people like professors and teachers and whatnots who see education only as a way to make a living and they couldn't care less whether the students learn anything but they are a necessary evil. There have to be these kind of people, and even though a lot of them in my opinion are not competent to teach the things they are paid to teach, some of them are, and on the chance that we can get more of them, we should try to make as wholesome an environment in the educational avocation as possible. By cutting money, we don't do that. Coach Osborne had tried to use football to conjure by. He was saying that if you don't have good education, well, you are not going to have a good football team anymore because football players come here for the education they receive. Now notice how crafty Dr. Osborne is in the way he phrases himself when he is talking about football players. He didn't say they come here for the education offered by the University but they come for the education they receive which in a lot of cases is nothing. They come here to play football, not to be scholars, and he has never spoken out before on what was happening in terms of cuts to the University but the cuts (interruption).
