

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I will remember it next time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, I believe the motion before us is the adoption of the Chambers amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Anybody else who cares to vote. Record, Mr. Clerk.
