

time that the bill is outside the call. It was one of those named. Since there is no objection to Senator Hefner's amendment, I'll rule that we are going to go ahead with Senator Hefner's amendment. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: My light's been on and I understand...

SPEAKER NICHOL: A whole bunch of them.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, because I guess when they are all on we semaphore and get recognized. I'd like to ask Senator DeCamp a question or two, if I may, so that the issue will become clear. Senator DeCamp, was this one of the bills that the Attorney General said was within the call?

SENATOR DECAMP: I believe it was one of the bills the Attorney General said was within the call.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And was the provision relative to the commission a part of the original bill?

SENATOR DECAMP: I'm not aware of that. I think it might have been. I'd have to ask Senator Johnson. Was it?

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Vard Johnson, did you wish to respond?

SENATOR DECAMP: Was this provision on collections within the bill?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. Chairman, we have never felt bound in this body by what the Attorney General has said, unless it was convenient for our particular side. I think if the issue of whether or not a bill is within the call is raised, at whatever time it is raised it seems to me that consideration would have to be given to it because the bill is the vehicle by which these various amendments will get from wherever they are starting to where they expect to go. So if a point of order has been appropriately raised in reference to the bill itself, then I think the Chair, this is my opinion now, I think the Chair should rule on the point of order that was raised rather than on one that was not raised. No point of order was raised with reference to Senator Hefner's amendment, with which I disagree by the way. But as Senator DeCamp pointed out, and sometimes John is exasperating when he is right because, and I'm sure they
