

to deal with the entire issue. I contend and agree that is correct. But the Attorney General's Opinion goes two directions. It says when I need my bill inside you are right, but when I want to keep all the other stuff outside you are wrong. I say you've got one rule and it applies across the board. If you say the Speaker is right in overruling it, with the very arguments you've used, Senator Johnson, then you have also said he is wrong on limiting, in the other ways he's trying to, the call. That is my point. So I think I'm going to vote to overrule the Chair and pray the Chair gets sustained because I think...I made the motion to overrule and I think I have to be consistent. But by the same token I think the Chair has said, in effect, and the arguments have said in effect the call is far broader and we do have those inherent legislative powers to deal with the subject completely.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, the question is, shall the Chair be overruled? How many votes will that require, Mr. Clerk? Twenty-two votes are required to overrule the Chair. The question again before you is, shall the Chair be overruled? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Please vote. Have you all voted? Anybody else that wishes to vote? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a request for a record vote. (Began reading record vote.) Senator DeCamp requests a roll call.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Roll call vote has been requested. Call the roll, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See pages 104-05 of the Legislative Journal.) 3 ayes, 29 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to overrule the Chair.

SENATOR BEUTLER: The motion fails.

CLERK: Mr. President, we are now discussing Senator Hefner's amendment to the bill.
