I get ten minutes on each opening and I get to close even if they manage to cut off debate without a discussion of the issue and I assure you I can talk fifteen minutes on each proposition I put up there.

SENATOR DECAMP: Senator Chambers, I am well familiar with your abilities to talk.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Learnedly.

SENATOR DECAMP: My question to you is if we don't take the amendment up now, if we wait until Select File, will you obstruct at least getting a vote to advance the bill today or...
