We'll back up here a moment and vote on a call of the house. Will you clear the board please if you haven't. Now the question is, shall the house go under call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 15 ayes, 2 nays to go under call. .

SPEAKER NICHOL: The house is under call. Will you please record your presence. Those not in the Chamber, please return to the Chamber and record your presence. How many are excused, Mr. Clerk? Please record your presence. Senator Higgins. Senator Wesely, Senator Haberman. We're looking for Senator Haberman. Senator Higgins, for what purpose do you rise?

SENATOR HIGGINS: Mr. Speaker, could I have a point of clarification?
