SENATOR BEUTLER: As a purely technical legal matter he could not do that. But if he wants to make a false claim that that is the reason that he was fired rather than that he quit, if that is what you are saying.

SENATOR ROGERS: Well, right, that's what it would turn out to be because...

SENATOR BEUTLER: A person can always lie to the courts.

SENATOR ROGERS: Yes, but I say, this would be just something that would go to that particular judge or whoever is hearing that case, right?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yes. Well, the county attorney has to participate in the process and the county attorney, hopefully, will look at that in a common sense kind of way and say, this is not something we are going to prosecute.

SENATOR ROGERS: Okay, thank you.

SENATOR BEUTLER: You know, you have got to rely just like our whole judicial system, you have got to assume that there are sensible people acting in the different positions held in the process.

SENATOR ROGERS: But sometimes, what I am saying, it don't turn out sensible. Thank you.
