

as what they would or would not do as far as we were concerned as a committee. If you haven't received the list of what they propose, and we don't have one for 2 percent, by the way, we have one for 3 percent cut, but if you haven't received the list, I think you ought to look at it because I think that you will find, if you have any interest at all in higher education or in the University system, I think you will find some items on that proposed list that would not meet with your approval as well. And the purpose of opposing the amendment yesterday, and I will oppose a reconsideration, is not because I am in favor of closing the school at Curtis. It is because I want to make sure that they understand that we do not accept their list of possible cuts. We don't accept the list at the UN-L campus or the Institute and we do not accept the list at UN-O or at the Med Center or at Central Administration, for that matter. That is a decision, by the way, that must be made by the Board of Regents. We have had that told to us by the Supreme Court. So if we recognize that by saying that we want to oppose the closing of Curtis, there to me is a tacit implication that we are saying it is okay to look at the rest of them you have got on that list and that is exactly opposite of what I want to do. Besides the arguments made by Senator Carsten and Senator Warner that once you start seeing what you cannot do, you then...you narrow the area of what they can do. Besides that argument, I want you to know that the most important argument, as far as I am concerned, is by acknowledging any part of this list and saying, no, don't do that, that you can be giving tacit approval to the other items on that list and say, yes, that's okay, and it is not okay as far as I am concerned. If you look at the list, I think you would agree with me.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President and members, first of all I would like to explain. Placed on your desk is this little packet of Captain Milo Sorghum Breakfast Cereal. It is an example of what has been produced in cooperation with the University of Nebraska and the Grain Sorghum Checkoff Board. The research which went into this new breakfast cereal was done by a graduate student over at the University of Nebraska and was funded by the checkoff board. This is pure sorghum grain flour with 7 percent sugar and 1 percent salt. Very simple operation to make this cereal and it is hoped that exports of milo can be increased with this because some
