PRESIDENT: The committee amendments?

SENATOR DECAMP: The bill.

PRESIDENT: I don't know, hasn't been asked.

SENATOR DECAMP: It just was.

PRESIDENT: I guess the parliamentarian suggests that we go ahead with committee amendments and then take up your issue.

SENATOR DECAMP: I guess I've got to raise some questions about the process. By the way I understand it we can bring absolutely any proposal up here and then we deal with it, as we did yesterday, on the theory that somehow when we do the committee amendments, or whatever amendments that somebody anticipates, that haven't been adopted but are merely contemplated by one individual, then somehow everything falls within a call or outside the call. I think there's got to be some order here. It says the Legislature shall enter upon no business. I want to know whether this bill is under the call.

PRESIDENT: Okay, you are formally asking whether this bill is within the call, right? Senator Landis.
