SENATOR VICKERS: And inserts...isn't there something else inserted?

CLERK: No.

SENATOR VICKERS: Yes, that wasn't the point that I understood Senator Lamb represented. I would like to know what the new language...

CLERK: Senator, maybe you could read it to me and then...I had some difficulty up here.

SENATOR MOREHEAD: Senator Lamb.

SENATOR LAMB: Okay. Number two there would read, "That the Nebraska Legislature understands that the Federal Government may have no legal obligation," I'm leaving that language in there, Senator Beutler, "to provide such assistance, but request such assistance because the failure of the Farm Credit System would be a hammer blow to the the U.S. economy and prompt a wave of farm foreclosures." So I am leaving the language in there that some, I guess Senator Beutler, thought it was stricken.

SENATOR VICKERS: The amendment then is as explained by Senator Lamb. Is that correct, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: It will be. Yes, sir.

SENATOR VICKERS: Okay. Thank you. Well, Madam President, members, I rise to oppose the amendment based once more on the fact that the language that Senator Lamb is attempting to insert is an attempt to be somewhat specific, and again I would refer you to those handouts that you've got on your desk out of the papers today, that indicates that a collapse of the Farm Credit System is going to be reflected throughout, throughout our society, including the commercial banks, and I would happy to answer Senator DeCamp's question and I will do that a little later. But the fact is, the basic fact is that as elected officials we have moral obligations to our electorate and I think that the federal government has a moral obligation to us and I'm not willing to take that language out that tells them very specifically that we in Nebraska expect them to live up to that moral
