SENATOR SCOFIELD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ..doesn't matter because it is in the record and I plan to bring that record back to haunt certain members of the Legislature as I have other things on other occasions.

SENATOR SCOFIELD: Senator Nichol.

SPEAKER NICHOL: My fault, sorry, I am at the wrong speaker, that is why. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I have a couple of questions probably for Senator Beutler or for Senator Hoagland, and the question does not involve this particular amendment, and I don't have any problem with this amendment, but rather than present another amendment to talk on it, I just wanted to ask a quick question, and that is this. For example, some county presently wants to come under the umbrella of the state handling this for them, and they say, come on in, state, handle our child problem in our county. Then that county attorney is defeated in an election and the new one comes in, and the new county attorney says, I want to handle this on my own. So the problem comes up, and as I understand the amendment now, it says that by mutual agreement they will go back to letting the county attorney handle this on his own. But my problem is what if the Supreme Court says, to heck with you, we are going to keep it. You said one time you want it, we are going to keep it, there can be no mutual agreement. So what I see as developing is the Supreme Court developing a dynasty here where you can't get out of it unless they say so, and my feeling is they are not going to let you get out of that once you are in their clutches. So, Senator Beutler, I will ask you, is there some way you could amend that so that a county, if they wanted to go back and handle it themselves, could do so without being shackled by the Supreme Court?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Nichol, first of all, the Supreme
