

here in the Special Session. So I ask you to bring it back first. If you don't do that, then I ask you to vote no on LB 5. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Motion is to return the bill to Select File, offered by Senator Haberman. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote nay. Motion is to return LB 5 to Select File for specific amendment. Please record your vote. Have you all voted who wish to vote? Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record the vote, Mr. Clerk. Record vote has been requested.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Haberman requests record vote. (Read record vote as found on pages 240-41 of the Legislative Journal.) 19 ayes, 26 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to return.

PRESIDENT: Motion fails. The Chair would like, at this time, to take care of a couple of requests from senators for recognition. Senator Haberman has guests under the south balcony who are Dennis Schneider and sons, Mark and Scott, from Culbertson, Nebraska. And Senator Jerry Miller has as his guest a supervisor, County Supervisor of Kearney County, Mr. Don Egenberger. Would you please welcome these people to the Legislature this morning. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, I have a second motion on LB 5. Senator Haberman would move to return for the purpose of striking the enacting clause.

PRESIDENT: Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, members of the body, I just want to, one more time, give you the opportunity to explain to you what you are doing so that there is never any doubt in anyone's mind. You are taking money from the citizens that was tax for a particular purpose, to help children learn how to drive. Now if you vote for LB 5 you are taking that money and putting it in the General Fund and going to blow it; you don't know where it is going, it isn't earmarked, they can spend it on anything when that wasn't the purpose. So for the credibility of this body let's stick with why we put it on there in the first place and be honest about it. How can you go home and tell the citizens that you are taxing them for a specific reason, but then all of a sudden a few years later you decided it wasn't a good
