

SPEAKER NICHOL: One more after you.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay, then I'll pass.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Okay. Senator Pappas. All right. Senator DeCamp, would you like to close on your motion, please.

SENATOR DECAMP: Well, I think the exchange between Senator Chambers and myself really, clearly illustrated this particular amendment. I would ask adoption of it at this time.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The question is the adoption of the DeCamp amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator DeCamp's amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The DeCamp amendment is adopted. Do you have anything else on the bill?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Lamb would move to amend the bill. (Lamb amendment appears on pages 88-9 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Lamb, please.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, you will remember our discussion yesterday in regard to an amendment which Senator Vickers offered to LB 1. You have on your desk this amendment. It's not in the Journal. It is on your desk. It is not in the bill drafter's form. I guess the plug got pulled on the computer, but we do have the amendment on your desk. Now, the concern that some of us were expressing yesterday is that when you go in and pay off your loan your name continues to stay on this computer list, unless, as it says in the bill, the borrower decides to or requests that it be taken off. Some of us objected to that because we did not think that the borrower should need to request to have his name taken off the computer list, that it should be done automatically, as Senator Vickers indicated in his amendment. But that, of course, ran into some static by the financial people. So, this amendment that you have on your desk represents a compromise that I think accomplishes what we wanted to do. It says that the secured party shall notify the debtor, in writing, of his
