

SPEAKER NICHOL: Senator Harris, please.

SENATOR HARRIS: I call the question, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER NICHOL: Thank you, but you were the last speaker. But thank you anyway. Senator Lamb, would you like to close on your motion, please.

SENATOR LAMB: The point is well taken that we do not want to put unnecessary burdens on the borrower, or on the banker, or the lender. That is one of the reasons that we worked this out with the lenders. This amendment is acceptable to them. They have no problems with it. So, while it is, as we mentioned before it is not a big issue. I think it would be helpful to some of those borrowers who think that automatically their name is going to be taken off the computer list. So, since the lenders have agreed to the proposal, I would hope that this body would adopt the amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: You've heard the closing on the Lamb amendment. The question is the adoption of the Lamb amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. We are voting on the adoption of the Lamb amendment. Record, Mr. Clerk, please.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 1 nay, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Lamb's amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The Lamb amendment is adopted. Do you have anything else on it, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Vickers would move to amend the bill. (Vickers amendment appears on page 89 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER NICHOL: All right. Senator Vickers, please.

SENATOR VICKERS: Mr. President, members, you have this amendment on your desk. It was not printed in the Journal either. It is on the same subject. It is very similar to the amendment that I offered to you yesterday. The issue, it seems to me, is not one of putting up roadblocks in terms of a system whereby the lenders would feel less secure in any way, or provide less in terms of capital to rural Nebraska. I think Senator Schmit's point should be well taken, and that is that we had ought not to create situations where people simply don't get the funds that they would be entitled to. Probably the
