Anyway, I ask you to adopt it so that you accomplish the purpose for which you came. Why did you come? To restore credit to agriculture. That is how you do it. I ask you to adopt it.

SENATOR CARSTEN: The question is, shall the DeCamp amendment be adopted? All those in favor will vote aye, those opposed will vote no. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 15 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of the amendment.

SENATOR CARSTEN: The amendment is adopted. Do you have anything further on the....

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Senator Johnson, would....

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: I would simply move the bill.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Motion is to advance the bill. All those in favor will vote aye, those opposed will vote no. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 35 ayes, 6 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to advance the bill to E & R for Engrossment.

SENATOR CARSTEN: The bill is advanced. What do we have on the desk now, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Mr. President, a few items to read in, if I might. Your Committee on Enrollment and Review respectfully reports they have carefully examined engrossed LB 1 and find the same correctly Engrossed. (See pages 98-99 of the Legislative Journal.)
