This bill, 999, in my supporting it, does not get my support because I think it is going to keep people in farming as a business, it is for the doomed farmer. The doomed farmer that would be helped by 999 is not going to have credit extended, whether you repeal 999 or keep Senator DeCamp's waiver in there, because when they go to get a loan they are not going to get it anyway. What you all want to blind your eyes to is the fact that we are going to have a lot of families with no place to go.

SPEAKER NICHOL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: You won't deal with that. What becomes of the families with no place to go, who can get no credit, who are not even thinking about staying in farming? That is the theory of 999, and you won't touch it. But I'm going to mention it over and over, because this issue will come before us again. But it is going to be in the form of us trying to find a way to provide benefits for those people who are without, and we'll be doing for them what we did for a lot of businesses that went under. Those business people said obtaining welfare is too degrading. Those who lost their homes during tornados said it is too embarrassing to have to go through all of these questions. So, you know what the State of Nebraska did? It set up a different procedure for those better class of people to get their welfare. They didn't have to go through the traditional, degrading system, and that is in the State of Nebraska. They set up a different procedure, and that is what you are going to want to do with these people that you are disregarding now. I will be here to try to help pick up some of those pieces...

SPEAKER NICHOL: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and bind up those wounds, and maybe be what Jesus called the good Samaritan, and I know there are a lot of other senators who will assume that role, too. But we won't be able to give those people a place to stay, as we have the opportunity of doing now.
