I hope John becomes a lobbyist because he's going to have to come back to all those senators who, when John was a senator and came to them, they shook like leaves on trees, and John is going to have to come to them with hat in hand, asking for something that they are in a position, finally, to deny. That is an awesome prospect, and John is too proud to do that, so John won't be a lobbyist. But should he be a lobbyist I want to be around. And we all have our ideas of which senators are most pliable. I'll just hide in a corner some place and watch when John approaches one of those individuals, and see the change in positions. Gulliver becomes the Lilliputian, and the Lilliputian becomes Gulliver, and we say how things change when the worm turns. In all seriousness, I think we ought to return this bill and strike that pernicious amendment because it is not going to open credit, it will simply provide a basis to wring more out of those who have so little. And the pieces, when they fall, will be there for those of us who have some concern to pick them up. And we will have an obligation to pick them up, and we will do the best we can.

SPEAKER NICHOL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But we will have fewer pieces to pick up, and we will have more to work with if you strike Senator DeCamp's amendment.

SPEAKER NICHOL: You've heard the closing. The question is the adoption of the Chambers...the return for a specific amendment by "Dr." Chambers...Senator Chambers. He is a doctor. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record vote. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: (Read record vote. See page 116 of the Legislative Journal.) 11 ayes, 34 nays, Mr. President, on the motion to return the bill.

SPEAKER NICHOL: The motion fails. Are you ready to read the bill?
