

Notwithstanding how you feel about the bill, notwithstanding how you feel about the court case, notwithstanding how you feel about any aspect of telephone deregulation, the facts are that here are \$158,000 which you can just as well take back and appropriate to some other good cause. I think you ought to remember that, before this special session is over, there is going to be blood all over the floor as we try to find a few dollars. The next legislative session will be the...a repeat of the same. And the Appropriations Committee, and the Revenue Committee have just about reached their wits end, there is no two ways about it. What I am saying here is in a small way an example of what I think could be done with the number of agencies, but certainly in this instance with the Public Service Commission, just forget that the money was appropriated for LB 835. You're not going to need it. It's like if you had a vacation planned to go to Hawaii for this period of time. You're not going to go, so you don't need to keep the money ratholed. Well, there are a couple of people, Senator Hall says, who are gone. They went, and more power to them. But the vast majority of us are here. And, so, I would hope that regardless of how you feel about the bill that you vote to take those funds and make them available for some other purpose. I know that there are some arguments that I'm not going to present to you today, relative to the merits and demerits of the bills. I'm not going to argue that. That will come at another time and another place. But even my good friend, Senator DeCamp, my ally, my associate, my departing colleague, how about that, that's pretty good,...
