

SENATOR LYNCH: Senator Warner, have we implemented the Touche-Ross report of 1983 yet?

SENATOR WARNER: Have we what?

SENATOR LYNCH: Have we implemented the 1983 institutional Touche-Ross report?

SENATOR WARNER: No, not in total, no.

SENATOR LYNCH: Okay.

SENATOR WARNER: Are you asking me if I object to your amendment?

SENATOR LYNCH: No, no. I just was...

SENATOR WARNER: I do not.

SENATOR LYNCH: Okay, fine. The reason I suggested this is, by the way, that should it be implemented the possibility exists that we could in fact save about \$1.5 million. There are also...and I think that is very important for us, especially when we are considering a \$300,000 cut as far as MR is concerned. I guess I have to ask another question, if I could, Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Yes.

SENATOR LYNCH: It is my understanding that if the model were implemented in 1984-85, we would have billed for \$84.36 a day when, in fact, we billed...and we recover 57 percent of that, by the way, but, in fact, we billed for \$101.00 a day. In 1985-86 we should have billed, based on that Touche-Ross report, \$87.28 a day, and we billed for \$103.00 a day. That is about \$16 more. I assume that in 1986-87 we are billing about the same amount. Is that about correct, or do you know?

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Lynch, as far as I know, I don't pretend to keep all those figures in my head. As I say, I have no problem with the amendment. So, I'd be glad to see what results it gives us.

SENATOR LYNCH: Well, it is very important because it can lend itself to helping with a better and more equitable distribution
