

90 percent, or equal to the 90 percent. So, it doesn't change any...it doesn't take away any dollars from the school districts that are already committed to it, but it does set up a mechanism whereby there will be no more increases, or no more deficiency appropriations.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Where it says a 1 percent reduction in aid, that won't be true then?

SENATOR VICKERS: Where it says what, Senator Haberman? I'm sorry.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Why don't you turn to the fiscal note then you can follow me.

SENATOR VICKERS: Well, I am. Tell me what you said again, please.

SENATOR HABERMAN: It says, figures below represent a 1 percent reduction in aid payments for each activity. Transportation 70,000, residential care 4,000, program reimbursement 560,000. That indicates that those will be a reduction. Does your amendment take that reduction away or leave it the way it is now, the same amount of money?

SENATOR VICKERS: It changes it totally. First of all, it takes transportation totally out, it takes residential care totally out, neither one of those are in the bill even anymore under our amendment. And as far as the program reimbursement is concerned, the...as I told you, there will be no change for next year's dollar figure.

SENATOR HABERMAN: So, this fiscal note...

SENATOR VICKERS: No savings, I should say, I should put it that way.

SENATOR HABERMAN: This fiscal note is of no value then due to the way the amendments are drawn.

SENATOR VICKERS: This fiscal note applies to the green copy of the bill, and does not apply to the committee amendments.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay, do you...this is probably going to advance between now and then. Do you suppose you could get us a new one?
