

SENATOR CARSTEN: Motion fails. It is not adopted. Do you have another one on the desk, Mr. Clerk? The call is raised but don't get too far away.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have is by Senator Chambers. (See Chambers amendment (7) as found on page 47 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CARSTEN: Senator Chambers, on your next amendment, please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I believe this is the one numbered (7) and it deals with the Library Commission.

CLERK: Yes, sir.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Warner, may I ask you a question.

SENATOR CARSTEN: Senator Warner, will you respond, please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The cut from the Library Commission will affect what? Mr. Chairman, could you turn on Senator Warner's mike.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, the agency indicated that the reduction at this point for the balance of this fiscal year was essentially...would be handled from vacancy saving, some reductions such as that. The long run reductions would probably be in the area of reduced microfilming, some reduction probably in acquisition of materials. There is an issue that we have to watch next year, it is no problem now, but in order to retain their current level of federal funds, you have to have a maintenance of effort requirement, and if this cut was annualized, as it probably could only be annualized at about \$9,000 instead of double the amount that...otherwise. But the kind of thing that they would be doing was the kind of things I mentioned.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And, Senator Warner, would you describe these things you mentioned as essential library functions and services, I mean of the nature of the work that a library or Library Commission should do, or are they just tangential or fringe items which really need not be done?
