But we compartmentalize knowledge in our efforts but a time comes when these things should be synthesized and we should become fully functioning well-rounded human beings and I think what will make that possible is information of the kind that libraries deal with. That is the repository of the society's knowledge. The writer is more important than the doer, because had there not been anybody to write about Christ, nobody would know about Christ. The writings are retained and maintained in the libraries and I hope, even though it is a symbolic gesture, we will vote to return this \$7,000.
