Mr. Chairman, let me read this so I don't get it wrong, I move that the Eighty-Ninth Legislature, the Fourth Special Session of the Legislature, having finished all business before it, now at nine forty-seven adjourn sine die. That is proper. If you went to a Jesuit school, you say sine die. If you are a Protestant, you say sine die, and they are mostly Protestants.
