

early that said that no person may challenge the validity of any of these rules and regulations in question on the basis of information provided pursuant to this section. What I want to be clear on is if, for example, an agency should fail to give us notice, or fail to provide any piece of information, omit information, or omit the notice altogether, this is not going to be any basis whatsoever for any lawyer to make any argument in court with regard to failure of procedure, right? That's your intent, is that not correct?

SENATOR COORDSEN: I think I'm on. Yes, that is language out of another part of the Administrative Procedures Act, and that is the intent that failure to comply with this, or failure to comply with every detail of this particular statute would not be able to be used in challenging the validity of a rule or regulation in a court case.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Yes. Madam Speaker, members of the Legislature, I had my chance with the kill motion, it failed. I will take one brief speech, I'll sit down and we'll vote to advance on this measure. If you take a look at the amendments that Senator Beutler offered and which were slowly passed onto the bill by this body, it basically devolves all the work that would have come to us to a staff member. Basically, it passes onto a committee counsel or a staff person for the board. This bill started off to try to make us do our job better by making us be responsible for rules and regs. And now, when push comes to shove, we've pushed it off on somebody else, it's not going to bind us, it's going to bind our staff. They're the ones that are going to do the work now under this bill. It's going to be department agency staff and it's going to be our staff, and we aren't going to have to practically read a word here or do a thing, because it will be our staff that will be making the reference come summertime, and it will be our staff that will be reviewing the rules and regs, I suppose, on the theory that this is going to make us do our work better. If you want to send your staff, and you want to tell your staff what to do, I suggest that you have the responsibility to make that decision yourself. I don't want a law telling my staff what to do in this situation. It seems to me the Banking, Commerce and Insurance Committee staff can be well directed by the members of
