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unless we challenge the Chair right now, we're going to lose that right to do that and that we should do.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Landis. We will now proceed down the Speaker's list if you wish to speak to this motion to overrule the Chair. Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Mr. Speaker and members, if I was at Memorial Stadium and I had a striped shirt on, I would pull my penalty flag and call foul, foul on this. The time to raise the 95 votes was a long time ago. This morning we've had a very spirited and long debate. We all played by the rules, obvious as it may be, that's...the whole debate is about the rules. And, at this point in time, at literally after twelve o'clock, to come in with this issue is unfortunately too late. Let's stand by the Chair, vote on the issue and settle this issue this morning.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Moore. We will now go to Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, unless there is widespread outcry, I would call the question.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Schmit, I would have to rule that that's not in order right now. We have not had sufficient debate on this. Senator Ashford.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Mr. President and members, I would like to ask Senator Warner a couple of questions if I could, so I can get some background on the process here.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Warner, would you respond?

SENATOR ASHFORD: Senator Warner, during the Executive Board proceeding on this...in this case, did anyone that you can recall raise the issue of the 95 ballots?

SENATOR WARNER: I can recall that there was...certainly, I don't recall specifically who may have raised that issue but I certainly can recall reference to that. The basis, as I recall, if it was discussed, was on that it was not in the election contest that was filed with the clerk. The election contest was restricted to the section of law dealing with absentee ballots and I hate to say it but we followed the law and restricted our
