

bankers who have said we won't touch a solid waste site after having seen the mishmash of bills that have been introduced in the Legislature. There is no way that we can possibly finance a solid waste site at this point, when next week, next month, next year, a Legislature may decide to make it financially impossible to function. Now it is possible for this Legislature to put private industry out of business. It has happened before and it will happen again. We usually do not do it in a punitive manner, but we have, and we may do it again. Usually, when we have a problem such as this, which private industry and in some cases government have decided to work together toward a solution, the Legislature is usually wise enough not to mess it up. I really believe in this case we are going to mess it up. My other concern is this that if we proceed in the direction in which we are going that what will happen is that we will continue the operation of the landfills upon an as is basis...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR SCHMIT: ...without supervision, without control, without regulation, and unless I am badly mistaken, there will come a time when in one of those landfills something will be deposited that will cause a serious problem relative to underground water, soil, or the atmosphere, and when that occurs, ladies and gentlemen, you will find a hue and cry being raised as to why something wasn't done, and we will proceed on a crash basis to do something. The first thing that will have to be done will be to inspect all the garbage at all the unlicensed dumps, and I am going to volunteer members of the Legislature to serve as dump inspectors if you continue to vacillate on this problem. I really believe,...
