But the other thing, do you think that the public schools, when they do the posting and so on, if this happens, do you think that there might be certain parents who might not like that? I mean do you think that they will have any problems with people coming saying, well,...

SENATOR WITHEM: It is a potential that is hard to judge. There might be some parents who would have problems with it, I could conceive that.

SENATOR CROSBY: Actually, it just simply, it's just going to state the law. It isn't going to have much else on it?

SENATOR WITHEM: That is correct.

SENATOR CROSBY: Right. Okay, well, that thought just went through my mind. I didn't know if actually you had cleared it with the public schools or with any other schools that you think that it might go in. I am going to vote for the amendment because I agree that some way or another they should be aware of what is going on, because, after all, as someone else stated, it is not you and I that are having the problem, it is the young people, if it is a problem or whatever it is. So I will vote for the amendment. Senator Labeledz, would you like the rest of my time.
