

restrictions in the bill. It sounds like no one is really tremendously interested. I might even just be able to say...stand here and sing a song or something, and no one would know the difference. But I think, for the record, I should tell you that there are some other things in the bill, some easing of the statutes. I want to emphasize that this amendment does not only place additional restrictions on gaming activity, but it does ease a number of restrictions enacted, which over time the department has now...the division has now come to consider unnecessary. In Section 2 they eliminate the finger-printing requirements for commercial lessors. In Sections 15 and 19, they allow a licensed organization to be a commercial lessor of bingo premises. Section 19 allows for the use of bingo balls that are not all the same color. It includes in the allowable expenses for bingo the amounts paid in connection with the rental or lease of personal property related to bingo, bookkeeping fees, attorney fees, and janitorial fees, and exempts the payment of attorney fees from the requirements that all bingo expenses be paid for from the bingo checking account. Section 24 eliminates the one year use requirement of the designated premises for an organization licensed to sell pickle cards. Section 33 provides for the personal delivery of pickle card units by sales agents to a pickle card operator, or delivery by mail, or common carrier. That was a big issue one year, a couple years back. Section 57 provides for the sale or transfer of lottery equipment between lottery operators in counties, cities, or villages. That's a very basic overview of what's in this 125-page amendment. And if there are specific questions, I'll try to answer them, if not, I would ask the body's consideration in adopting this amendment to the bill. Thank you.
