SPEAKER BAACK: The house is under call. All members please report to the Chamber and record your presence, the house is under call. Call in votes are authorized.

CLERK: Senator Pirsch voting yes. Senator Landis voting yes. Senator Hall voting yes. Senator Morrissey voting yes. Senator Hartnett voting yes. Senator Schrock voting yes. Senator Dierks voting yes. Senator Beutler voting yes.

SPEAKER BAACK: Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Debate has ceased on the Chambers amendment. Senator Chambers, do you wish to close?
