SENATOR ABBOUD: I understand that but I...the language here where it says, requires player interaction, it doesn't...I mean, that's the way I read it that if you have player interaction, then that game would be unconstitutional if this amendment was attached to the constitutional amendment and this was enacted into law.

SENATOR SMITH: Well, my counsel also reminds me of something else and that is that this amendment only applies to this constitutional provision, not to the local option, so that is another safeguard if you have the concern. And if you do have a concern, that's something that could be addressed.

SENATOR ABBOUD: Well, I...

SENATOR SMITH: My intent is...

SENATOR ABBOUD: I support...

SENATOR SMITH: ...to address only the video lottery.

SENATOR ABBOUD: ...I support your intent for the amendment, I'm just...

SENATOR SMITH: Yeah.

SENATOR ABBOUD: ...I question some of the language involved with it. That's...and maybe that's something we can discuss...

SENATOR ABBOUD: ...off the floor.
