

addressed some of the issues involved here. Now I could see, and I do have language here that I would offer to some legislation, if this bill is bracketed, that would allow for the current plans to continue and not have to change. And so there's a way to negotiate and work on that. But the bigger changes envisioned by this bill seem to me to be imprudent at this time. And so I would encourage the body to bracket the bill, and to deal with the specific problem about those specific plans, with the specific amendment, but not this broad-brush approach that I think has potential for very serious problems for the State of Nebraska subdivisions. With that, I'd ask for a call of the house and a vote on the motion to bracket.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Wesely. We do have a motion for a call of the house. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 19 ayes, 1 nay to go under call, Madam President.

CLERK: (Roll call vote taken. See pages 2024-25 of the Legislative Journal.) 6 ayes, 35 nays.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The motion fails. We will proceed with General File debate on LB 167. I will raise the call, and we'll go back to committee amendments. Senator Landis. Senator Landis, you're recognized for the committee amendments.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you. Senator Lynch asked me the question of what is the role of the state in oversight. There is state oversight with respect to the insurer, that is to say the company that's providing excess insurance coverage. They are governed by insurance law. Their practices are covered by the
