When you look at some of the items or some of the aspects of it that Senator Withem, Senator Hall have already mentioned about what it does within the community, when you look at some of the promotions that allow different disadvantage to kids groups to allow them to go out and see a ball game, those types of things, I think when you get into them, I think certainly it does fall within community betterment. I think...

SENATOR WARNER: One minute.

SENATOR LINDSAY: I think it would also turn a little bit on the fact, it may be kind of a fact question of what exactly does...do the Royals do and I think if you looked into it that I think it would be...fall within that purpose.

SENATOR SMITH: All right, thank you, Senator Lindsay, and I want you to know that I'm not doing this in any way to be negative about the amendment. What I'm doing is for the record, getting the intent that we have here as far as what we interpret community betterment to be in this record in the body today. Thank you.

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you. Would Senator Chambers respond to a few questions?

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I will, Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Senator Chambers, I have been listening to your disparaging remarks about the game of baseball this morning. Do you recall there was another piece of legislation that we dealt with this session that directly affected a sport, and I think it was a bill that you introduced regarding college athletics and the way that the NCAA deals with its member institutions?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I recall that bill, and you supported it, Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: In fact, I believe I was the only other person to speak in favor of the bill on General File.
