SENATOR WILL: And that's when there are individuals that are called managers that are the people that are in charge of the players on their team and what their team does and gives instructions.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR WILL: And there are other individuals called umpires and the umpires are those that interpret the rules and make various determinations as the game goes on.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that everybody curses at.

SENATOR WILL: And then everybody curses at them, that's what I was getting to.
