SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Will. I've got a list of speakers here. I'll go through and see if you wish to speak to this amendment. Senator Smith, do you wish to speak to this amendment? Senator Schmit. Senator Abboud. Senator Warner. Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Just to say, Mr. Speaker, there was no other way to draft this amendment not knowing what was going to be on the bill at the time. I left this amendment till last knowing that it was going to be the most controversial of those that had been filed. I have no problem with the amendment whatsoever.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Hall. Senator Will, do you wish to close on your amendment?

SENATOR WILL: Yeah, I just would...hope that we can adopt this amendment rather quickly and get back to the main body of the Hall amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: We will now proceed to vote on the amendment offered by Senator Will. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on the amendment to the amendment by Senator Will. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Have you all voted? We are on Select File so these take 25 votes. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Will and Lindsay's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Smith would move to amend Senator Hall's amendment. (Smith amendment appears on page 2214 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I have an amendment here and I think that Senator Hall will be supportive of it when he understands what I'm doing. On the bottom of page 2 of your amendment, Senator Hall, line 24, the word "state", you're talking here about the 50 percent of the
