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of the matter is, ladies and gentlemen, this is nothing more than dollars, nothing more than dollars that say, look, let's update the office, let's get them in line so we can be, I think, to a point where we can say, this office can function to the point where the Legislature is at least satisfied with where it's been. I don't disagree with the...

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR HALL: ...the point that the Appropriations Committee has treated them well. That's not the issue at all. I want to treat them a little better and put them into a position where they can function to where I'm satisfied with where they're at. I understand the difficult decisions the Appropriations Committee has to make. They're tough, they have to say no to a lot of people. It's not a pleasant job. The fact of the matter is, that's why we have this process where we try to amend the budget and bring in amendments that deal with areas that the Legislature and the Appropriations Committee has felt have been underfunded, in my opinion, that's all. And I think it's going to generate more dollars down the road, because the capability will provide additional manpower to look at more things, not performance audits, not performance audits at all. It won't address that one bit. It only deals with the issue of updating equipment that's currently out there. We don't have any personal computers for these auditors. We've got 50 auditors.

SPEAKER BAACK: Time. Senator Robak, you're next.

SENATOR ROBAK: Call the question.

SPEAKER BAACK: Do I see five hands? I do. We will now vote on ceasing debate. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on ceasing debate. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 1 nay to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Debate has ceased. Senator Hall, would you like to close on your amendment.

SENATOR HALL: The amendment does this, it allows for \$215,000 to be spread out, over two years in the budget, to go in the auditor's office for the purpose of purchasing equipment that they need, and you've got that handout before you. What do they
