SPEAKER BAACK: That may be the brightest thing you've said. (Laughter.) Senator Pirsch, do you wish to address the Hall amendment?

SENATOR PIRSCH: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senator Hall, when I first pushed my button we were considering AM2020, and Senator Wickersham's amendment. And, quite frankly, I was going to oppose that, for the same reasons that you put on the...on your handout sheet, disadvantages of the employer occupation tax. Small business is something that I am very concerned about, and I don't think that would be the way to go. But I am intrigued, also, with the limited service...tax on services that you have given us, on legal services, accounting services, engineering, architectural, printing and publishing. And I think I am going to surprise you and vote for this amendment to the amendment and support the amendment. And I am surprising myself also.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Pirsch. Senator Crosby, did you wish to address the Hall amendment?

SENATOR CROSBY: Yes, Mr. Speaker. Thank you very much. And, Senator Hall, I want to say Senator Landis, a little while ago, berated us and said we don't appreciate you. Yes, we do. We appreciate you and your committee. All of us appreciate each one of the committees because each committee works long, hard hours, and I know you have. And I suppose I could come up with a plan, but why should I when there are so many out there, Senator Landis. Do you want another one? Tonight I'll work on another one. On this particular amendment, I do compliment you for bringing to a head and trying for...and making us deal with the tax on services, because everybody has tossed that around for years, and every time people say immediately, well, the consumer will pay it. That's probably true. I noticed you omitted medical services, which I think is a good idea, because that's where the individual would be concerned and probably pay a lot more than, as you say, I am sure probably you're right, although you don't have your law degree yet, right? You'll find out maybe how many individuals or corporations come to you when you start practicing. But you do say that legal services, accounting services, and engineering services, and those are used a lot by business. And printing and publishing, at the
