

certainly one that from a very practical point of view, the additional filing fees on the corporate entities, does that include the nonprofits as well? In other words, you have a nonprofit organization for the local Optimist Club. You have one for your cemetery trust that takes care of the perpetual care of the cemetery. You've got a nonprofit for a school foundation so they can have a fund raising event so they can sell raffle tickets because they've got a 503C. Are the nonprofits included in this \$150 filing fee?

SENATOR HALL: Senator Kristensen, the...it was my understanding when we drafted the bill nonprofits were not. When we examined the language, as it exists, there is nothing in there that exempts them out very clearly. All right, so I would have to respond yes to your question, period.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Okay, do we have any idea what the breakdown of income is in that area? Is the nonprofits a big...are you...and you probably don't know any more about it than I do at this point in terms of (interruption).

SENATOR HALL: What percentage of that 7.5 million represents nonprofit?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Exactly. Right.

SENATOR HALL: I can't tell you right now. I really don't know but I would guess that it would be less than 25 percent, just off the top of my head. But I will...I can check that out.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I think in the big scheme of things if you're looking at proposals, you're going to have more headaches with the nonprofits being included in there because that's going to be the one that everybody is going to come to and that's what you're going to get hit day in and day out with is I've got this small, little nonprofit corporation, we handle less than a \$1,000 a year but we formed it and now all of a sudden I'm getting hit with \$150.

SENATOR HALL: I can answer the question now.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I understand you have more information so I'll...

SENATOR HALL: Yes.
