

proposal because what we try to do here is make sure that we have completely covered the bases as it relates to real property and the uniformity clause and also the personal property and the ability to treat it as a separate and distinct class, and the stricken matter, let's see, is only to make clarification as it relates to the word "tangible". One case where we strike that, insert "real" so that there is the same intent and same purpose, there is no ambiguity among sections within the committee amendments and then we do the same thing in the case where there is a...the term "property" shows up. We strike that, insert "land" and then we make the reference to the appropriate "Article", the "Constitution" and, with that, I would urge adoption of the amendment. It is strictly a technical correction to the committee amendments.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Hall. I have a list of speakers. I will check to see if you wish to speak on this amendment. Senator Lynch, did you wish to address this amendment? Senator Pirsch. SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, I have an amendment up there only for the purpose of allowing myself a little more time to talk about the speech I want to give and then I'll withdraw the amendment. I've placed on your desk a
