PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if the goal is to gut the bill, destroy it or harry the bill, then he's being successful at that. These farmers come in here, no, not farmers. They say they represent the interest of farmers, but that's not what the ordinary people out in the rural areas will tell some of us who go out there and talk to them. They wonder what these guys are really doing. This is a nefarious amendment. There should not be a majority of the body voting for this reconsideration motion, and if Senator Elmer is so enamored of this amendment, I hope the legislative business that he referred to as being important would impact on nobody other than himself.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Wehrbein, followed by Senators Wickersham, Beutler and Chambers.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I support the reconsider motion and I guess I was interested in Senator Chambers. I don't know that we ought to set a different standard either, Senator Chambers, and I guess I'd like to pursue a lot more of this conversation. It probably is not appropriate here. But the thing that I see in this is that this is taking railroad land that was designed originally for railroads, making it into a public parkway, if you will, public trail, and so things that were not ordinarily considered as attractive nuisances, in your words, which could be back in the middle of a section are now going to be very easily accessible to the public and it doesn't seem right to me to make landlords responsible for that at this time just because they have been out there where it's been inaccessible and was truly not an attractive nuisance up until it had access to the public. If this was a trail going along an area that was appropriate, I wouldn't have so much problem with trying to change this, but this is making what previously was inaccessible to the public now going to be very accessible and, through no fault of the landowner and I guess the farmers, if that's the term you want to use, through no fault of them, they are now going to be much more subject to the types of things I mentioned before in the operation of machinery and all that kind of things which I would consider part of the normal farming operation. I
